FROM THE PASTOR'S STUDY

Dear Church Family,

Sometimes in January and February, I like to take a step back and look at the big picture. Yesterday I ran across an article by a dear friend and mentor, the Dean of Yale Divinity School, The Reverend Dr. Gregory Sterling. Some people wonder if ministers have a minister, and I am grateful to claim Greg as mine. He

helped me navigate the job search, which led me to accept this call here on God's Acre. Greg assured me over several phone calls and lunches in New Haven that The Congregational Church of New Canaan has historically been very healthy, vibrant, and vital. I remember asking him point-blank, "is it a good place?" And without hesitation, he responded, "yes, if they offer it to you, you should go there."



In 2018 Dean Sterling invited me to serve on his advisory board, which I consider one of the great honors of my ministry because I get to give back to Yale Divinity School, the place that formed and shaped me. Before COVID, our Dean's Advisory Council gathered twice a year on our beloved campus and sat around a large U-shaped table. There were ministers at big steeple churches like ours and headmasters, doctors, lawyers, and financial advisors. It didn't take me long to realize I was receiving the baton passed by Rev. Skip Masback, representing the less common category of ministers who call children and youth their calling. Many people start out in children and youth ministry, but it is a rare bird that sticks with it after 10-20 years or more. (For the record, I love it now more than when I first started.) And when people ask me, "Why?" which they inevitably do, accompanied by a quizzical look that seems to doubt my sanity. I tell them that we get to be a part of the "molding and shaping process" of our children and youth and that how faith begins for them will shape who they become and how they respond to life. Will faith matter to our kids? Or will faith not matter at all?

Dean Sterling wrote a letter to the YDS community at the beginning of COVID and said:

Faith neither wishes for the impossible nor unrealistically ignores the fact that tragedy can happen to my family and me. Faith is the quiet confidence that no matter what we face, God will give us the strength to face it. But faith is more than confidence in God and God's love; faith is a life motivated to serve based on that confidence.

What does a faith that matters look like now? It means praying for those who are ill and scared and suffering. It means praying for medical workers and all who give care. It is helping those who are economically disadvantaged and those who have lost their jobs and suffer in silence. It means sharing what we have with others. It means reaching out to loved ones and acquaintances so we can make sure people are not feeling isolated, anxious, overwhelmed. It means making sure those in our community of faith and beyond get food, medication, and the medical care they need. Does faith matter? Yes, it matters immensely. Make no mistake your faith defines who you are. (Rev. Dr. Greg Sterling, "Why Faith Matters")

Almost two years into COVID, I think faith means realizing that we are worn down and not at our best; it means giving ourselves some grace and forgiveness. Faith means realizing that the person next to us might be struggling with anxiety or family issues and that they too might need some grace and forgiveness. Faith means going out of our way to "be the light of Christ for others," realizing that according to the numbers, more than half of all youth and adults are struggling right now with depression and anxiety, and mental health is at a crisis level. The simple act of asking the people around you how they are doing is perhaps the kindest and most Christ-like thing you can do. Sit. And listen.

Our faith assures us "when we do not know what the future holds, we do know who holds the future." (Shirley Guthrie, Christian Doctrine) Faithful people face the future, even a scary and unknown future, with calm and resolve. Why? Because their confidence is in God, not in themselves. Does faith matter? Yes, indeed. Our faith defines who we are and how we react to the challenges we face. In the end, faith matters most of all.

Christian Women's Book Club Join us in February




Card Ministry Team

What is the Souperbowl of Caring?

In 1990 it all began with a simple prayer: "Lord, even as we enjoy the Super Bowl football game, help us be mindful of those who are without a bowl of



soup to eat." This prayer was delivered to a small youth group in Columbia, SC by a seminary intern.

It gave birth to an idea. Why not harness the energy and enthusiasm of Super Bowl weekend, a time when people come together for football, food, and fun, to unite the nation for a higher good? Individuals and groups could collect dollars in soup pots and canned food for those in need and send every dollar and food donation directly to a local charity of their choice.

Since 1990 over \$170 million in dollars and food has been generated on through Superbowl Sunday collections benefiting thousands of soup kitchens, food banks, meal programs and other hunger-relief charities in local communities.

This year, on February 13, come to church school and participate in the Bible Bowl Challenge.

All children and youth are invited and encouraged to wear a sports jersey of any kind (football, soccer, baseball, etc), and come to church with canned goods to benefit the Open Door Shelter in Norwalk).
